Public Statement

Mr Gutherie- Andrews

There is a consistent attempt to de-legitimise trans people. First there is a dodgy claim that science shows there are only 2 sexes. There have always been intersex people whose external genitals don't match their internal organs or hormones.

And of course testerone levels are used to decide if a ciswoman or transwoman can compete as a woman in athletics.

Bible

Anti trans activists use the bible (Genesis 1 v 27) "male and female He created them". They ignore St Paul's egalitarian pronouncement to the Galatians "There is no male or female; since you are all one in Christ".

Transpeople's Lived Experience

The LGB divorce advocates expunge the trans history.

Probably the first recorded person who knew he was born in the wrong body was the emperor Heliogabalus (died 222 CE). He married a man and was referred to as "doma" instead of the male "dominus". He wanted a sex change so that he could have a vagina.

Some argue trans people have "a mental illness that denies biology".

This was shown to be false by Dr Magnus Hirschfield who was known throughout Europe and America as "the Einstein of Sex". He produced, and appeared in, the first gay film.

He published the first scientific investigation of gender nonconformity, with his 1910 "Transvestites: The Erotic Drive to Cross Dress (New Concepts in Human Sexuality). On it he argued

"Transvestites are women and men who feel reluctant and even refuse to dress in the clothing of their own sex. For them, the inherent drive to cross-dress is often more powerful than sexual drive itself.

Transvestites have been subjected not only to discrimination but also to criminal prosecution for following what, for them, was an inborn inclination".

He also introduced the term transgender in 1923. He helped in the world's first surgical transitioning of a medically declared man into her correct sex.

His "Institute for Sexual Science" was the world's premier research facility for education and counselling on transgender and gay-sexual function and psychology.

The Institute was a "must-see" stop for visiting celebrities like novelist Christopher Isherwood, whose insights are best known in the musical "Cabaret".

It became a gathering place for Berlin's thriving subculture of homosexuals, social cross dressers and true transgender people.

He showed that transvestism is a firmly rooted sexual-psychological phenomenon and cultural tradition, in spite of religious, legal and social sanctions. His book still is the most comprehensive treatise on the subject of transvestism.

Hirschfeld persuaded the Berlin police that some people knew that they were born in the wrong body. They were not "cross dressing", to endanger public morals, which was illegal, but dressing appropriately to their actual sex.

The police agreed.

Those holding a "transvestite certificate" signed by a doctor would not therefore be charged with public indecency.

The first LGBTQ+ organisation in America was based on Dr Hirschfield's pro-trans organisation, with the addition of concern for the homeless.

The advocates of a LGB divorce deliberately overlook the trans element of the birth of to the LGBQT+ Movement, the Stonewall riot.

The police didn't raid the mafia controlled Stonewall pub to stop them illegally selling liquor, since they received kickbacks. Neither did they arrest dancing homosexuals. They arrested cross dressers, including trans cross dressers as this was illegal. Where cross dressing was in dispute a lady police officer took the person into the loo and examined their genitals.

It was this abuse of the trans people that started the riot, and the movement that the anti gender LGB now want to leave to their own devices.

Administration Leaders Announcements

CIIr Annie Riddle

The City Council were delighted to see our beautiful Churchill Gardens used to such good effect as a backdrop for Wiltshire Creative's stunning production of The Tempest.

Our first grass cutting round of the season took 30 working days to complete.

The spring weather was ideal for grass to grow quickly, and we have had new team members to train, various bank holidays and some staff vacancies to contend with.

But our team are aiming for 5 grass cuts this year, whereas under the old idVerde contract there were three, so that's good news.

On the events front, following a busy Coronation weekend, our themed street sellers' markets continue to be very successful, offering family fun without the need to spend a lot of money. The dog show-themed event was particularly popular, dinosaurs are also proving to be perennial favourites, and we've got farm animals coming up next on July 9.

The Motor Show, featuring more than 100 vehicles of all ages, attracted a lot of attention, while this weekend we celebrated Armed Forces Day. Our staff work extremely hard over the summer weekends to put on such a range of events and we are very grateful for their professionalism and enthusiasm.

Our accessibility and inclusion task group is off to a great start, working in conjunction with Wiltshire highways officers on identifying where metal barriers across pathways can make life difficult for wheelchair users and parents with buggies, so that these obstacles can be removed or made more easily negotiable. Some councillors, working with the disability group DIGS, have undertaken disability access audits of our parks and open spaces, and there's more work to do on this.

The council leaders have begun a conversation with the Conservative group about consultation over future budgets, and survey materials are being prepared to engage with the public. Simultaneously we have been trialling the recording of meetings.

The city now has to meet the bill for the Parish Poll, which was just under £40,000.

The leaders have had a positive conversation with the Police & Crime Commissioner about anti-social behaviour issues. We were pleased to hear that the city will have 10 new officers by September, and that recruitment of PCSOs is continuing. The location of the new policing hub has still not been resolved, and an application to site it at High Post, as part of an industrial development, has just been turned down.

We continue to build relationships with our neighbouring parishes and to participate in the Place Partnership, looking forward to the impact of Bradbeers and Primark on the city's economy in October, and hoping customers will not be deterred by a combination of ongoing parking issues and Fisherton Street improvement works. The mural on the hoarding outside Debenhams will be re-used within the city.

A contract has been signed for work on our new depot to meet the needs of our teams.

A new contractor has also been signed up to work on our Christmas lights.

We have taken part in two consultation events organised by Wiltshire Council about how the planning system is working (or not) for parishes.

Our own Neighbourhood Plan is progressing more slowly than we had hoped. It is currently with a designer, being prepared for submission to Wiltshire Council in the form they require before we can receive their further comments.
