## **Public Questions and Statements**

#### Statement from Margaret Willmot

My name is Margaret Willmot: I am a committee member of COGS (the Cycling Opportunities Group Salisbury) and have been a community member of Wiltshire Council's Air Quality Management Group for Salisbury for many years.

Both the Action Plan and the Supplementary Planning document contain some worthy sentiments, but they fail to mention Wiltshire Council's very poor record of actually taking action on strategies and policies they have previously agreed. Consequently Salisbury continues to suffer from areas of poor air quality, and the detrimental effect this has on the health of residents and the cost to the NHS are spelt out in the AQAP (AQAP p. iv).

Rather than go through these documents in detail I would like to give three examples for the Action Plan, and a couple for the SPD, citing what changes need to be made to make these documents more effective in actually improving air quality in Salisbury.

#### Regarding the Action Plan:

1) On page 4 it is stated that the first AQAP was based on the initial Salisbury Transport Strategy, and that this resulted in the development of Salisbury's five P&R sites. However, as that first LTP made clear, park & ride sites had to be supported by other measures in order to incentivise both the use of P&R and alternative means of accessing the City. It was suggested that city centre parking spaces needed to be reduced by 2,400 to around 1,600 spaces and that city centre parking charges be increased by 10% per annum above the annual rate of inflationi.

The only significant parking spaces to be removed in Salisbury in the 20 years since publication of LTP1 have been those in the Guildhall and Market Square: this is far less than was envisaged in LTP1. There is likely to be further backtracking on the goal of removing parking spaces with Brown Street and Salt Lane car parks no longer being put forward for alternative uses in the emerging Core Strategy.

Each car parking space within the city is liable to lead to multiple vehicle movements each day, compounding the City's congestion and air quality problems.

Suggested change: The AQAP should acknowledge that a failure to fully implement the Park & Ride strategy as initially proposed results in the park-and-ride service underperforming.

The measures proposed for Salisbury [AQAP, p.41] should be expanded to include reference to steps to be taken to encourage the use of P&R (as proposed in other policy documents [see policies to increase P&R utilisation [CAF p. 21/22],

consideration of redevelopment of Salt Lane & Brown Street car parks [CAF p.36], [STS July 2018 e.g. Schemes H13, SC01, SC02, PT03])

2) The Central Area Framework had numerous proposals for reducing traffic in Salisbury: but only two are mentioned. These are Fisherton Street and improved links to the Railway station [AQAP, p. 4]: these have not been included because they will be the most effective in improving air quality, they are simply the two for which funding has so far come forward.

As a reminder, the CAFii stated that public realm proposals should follow proposals which included [ref CAF Section 5, e.g. p. 25]:

• Reduce car dominance and reallocate carriageway and parking space.

See LTP1 as follows:

Reduction in parking spaces "Currently there are around 4,000 long stay and short stay spaces in the city centre .... Following full implementation of park-and-ride, city centre spaces would gradually be reduced to around 1,600 spaces." (LTP1, [Wiltshire Local Transport Plan 2001/2-2005/6] p. 111)

Increase in parking charges "An annual increase in public on-street and off-street parking charges of 10% per annum above the annual rate of inflation". (LTP1, p. 111)

- Create more space for pedestrians.
- Improve the quality and frequency of crossing facilities.
- Consider and accommodate the needs of cyclists.

Suggested change:

The Measures proposed for Salisbury [AQAP, p.41] should be expanded to include all of the proposals in the CAF and not just the two which are mentioned and already underway.

3) Given that traffic is acknowledged to be the main source of pollution [AQAP p. 20] it seems obvious that the refreshed Salisbury Transport Strategy should be a key focus for solutions. However the Action Plan does not even refer to the full 101 page July 2018 version of the Salisbury Transport Strategyiii, but only to an earlier 16-page summary document which is sadly lacking in detail [AQAP p. 49, ref 30 in measure A8]. The STS contained details of 45 schemes (16 relating to Highways, 5

to Smarter Choices, 15 to Pedestrian and Cycling improvements and 9 to bus service improvements). A good number of these, if implemented, would lead to improvements in air quality (& the overall cost benefit rating would be considerably higher than the '5' which has been assigned to 'A8 Salisbury Transport & Parking Strategies' [AQAP p. 49].)

Suggested change:

The measures proposed for Salisbury [AQAP, p.41] should be expanded to include those schemes from the 45 identified in the Salisbury Transport Strategy which have the potential to lead to modal shift and improved air quality.

Regarding the Supplementary Planning Document

• The flowchart for determining site classification [AQ SPD, p12] does not take account of a development which does not exceed the thresholds in Appendix B but is in an AQMA, or which will contribute to existing air quality problems whether at the site or elsewhere.

• A 'low emissions travel plan' [AQ SPD, App D] is commendable but it sounds as if the prime consideration will be the use of low emissions vehicles. The top strategic priority in the Government's 'Decarbonising Transport' document is "Accelerating modal shift to public and active transport" and it is stated that "We will use our cars differently and less often".

Suggested change:

Sites of any size which will have an adverse impact on AQMAs, or which may lead to AQMAs being needed, should be treated as Type 2 or 3 rather than 1.

References to 'low emissions travel plan' should refer to 'Sustainable' or 'Smarter choices' travel plan rather than 'low emissions'.
