**Subject**: Morning Star - Rent Reduction Scheme Application In Principle

#### 1. Report Summary:

1.1. This report introduces one application Morning Star for the Rent Reduction Scheme, for tenancy of the Victoria Park Bowls Club.

#### 2. Background:

- 2.1. The Council allows sports, social clubs and not-for profit organisations operating from buildings and land it owns to pay a reduced rent, significantly below the market value in exchange for undertaking activity which has a community benefit.
- 2.2. The Pantry Partnership are the current rent reduced tenant of the site and have given notice of leaving the property from the 31<sup>st</sup> November 2023.
- 2.3. Morning Star have expressed an interest in taking the site on and are seeking an agreement in principle for the rent reduction scheme as they run parallel processes including applying for planning permission and assessing the building for amendments and/or repairs.
- 2.4. Corporate services have taken advice on the tenancy agreement, and this is in process.
- 2.5. Morning Star have engaged with the current tenant, Environmental Services and the Communities Team and local Counsellor, John Wells, in the formation of their plans for the Bowls club.
- 2.6. Morning star plan activity delivery on the site, plus the creation of office space for staff
- 2.7. The site would be manned three days per week.

### 3. Application Details:

- 3.1. Morning Star are a registered charity and private company limited by guarantee serving Salisbury and the immediate surrounding areas.
- 3.2. The Charity provides support for those who are homeless and those who suffer from drug or alcohol abuse or other addictions/
- 3.3. The charity provides practical support to those seeking housing, including food provision, furniture, advocacy and clothing.
- 3.4. They also deliver 12 week life recovery courses. Currently these are offered three times a year but the bowls club would enable these to be more frequent due to the absence of room hire costs.
- 3.5. Though tenancy at the club they also hope to provide
  - 3.5.1. A therapeutic community around their courses
  - 3.5.2. The opportunity to learn life skills
  - 3.5.3. Increased opportunities for volunteering and to 'give back'.

- 3.6. Morning Star aim to deliver all their work sustainably, recycling furniture and clothes and reallocating food waste.
- 3.7. Morning star already work with a range of charities and community support organisations across the city including Salisbury Foodbank, Turning Point, the Women's Refuge, and the Rough Sleeper Team. These relationships will be ongoing.
- 3.8. The application notes that while there is significant central government funding for crisis support on addiction, Morning Stars courses and approach look at prevention and ongoing community support, with a view to prevention of crisis.
- 3.9. 10 12 local people will benefit from each life recovery course
- 3.10. Morning Star also intend to work with current pantry partnership volunteers to continue the work they do in redistribution of foods that would otherwise go to waste.
- 3.11. "Our current lack of a central base, while working with chaotic clients means that we often lose touch with people as they do not know how to find us"
- 3.12. This work specifically benefits those who are on a low income due to barriers to work presented by addiction and homelessness.
- 3.13. Morning star has designated reserves equivalent to 3 months operating costs
- 3.14. The Rent Reduction will enable to organisation to channel additional funding directly into staffing costs to maintain consistent delivery and safe ratios. Full staffing costs are estimated as £21k, which they will seek to increase to £38k to bring in an additional staff member over the next year.
- 3.15. Morning Star will need to continue to see grant funding throughout their proposed tenancy at the bowls club.

#### 4. Officers Comments

- 4.1. This application makes clear connections between the work of Morning Star and their planned activity at the Victoria Bowls Club and the Council's Community Priorities
  - 4.1.1. Improving People's Wellbeing
  - 4.1.2. Bringing Communities Together
  - 4.1.3. Working to Celebrate or improve understanding of marginalised communities.
- 4.2. This organisation works to support aspects of our community who are often voiceless and seeks to give them skills and confidence to have that voice, or to advocate for them.
- 4.3. A visible presence for this charity in the city would be a positive step in inclusion.
- 4.4. Morning Star have a robust inclusion and access approach and include people with lived experience from their volunteers on the ground to their trustees.

- 5.1. Approve the Application in Principle to be approved by the Communities Manager when the tenancy agreement, planning permission and buildings insurance are in place.

Attending the Unit can help boost self-esteem and confidence, in the past the Unit has hosted two young people who had been in trouble and were wearing electronic tags, both claimed they wanted to change. Sometime later as a result of their efforts and the support of the Unit the club were able to submit a report to the courts via the Probation Service and both tags were removed early. These two cadets went on to become value members of Sea Cadet Adult Staff. The team were recently approached by two cadets who had just passed their apprenticeships in Mechanical Engineering requesting permission to establish a new Marine Engineering Workshop in the Sea Cadet Unit, and realising the list of tools and equipment were expensive, the unit managed to convince the Regional Manager of Halfords that this was a worthy cause and gained sponsorship to equip the ne Marine Engineering Workshop Rent reduction assists with the training and bursary system
