1. Report Summary:

1.1. This report introduces a new policy and procedure relating to Unauthorised Encampments for Council to consider.

2. Background

- 2.1. Salisbury City Council owns and maintains much of the accessible green space in the city.
- 2.2. On occasion, unauthorised encampments occur on Council land and the Policy & Procedure that accompanies this paper, sets out how the Council is recommended to tackle those encampments. This will be in a fair, proportionate, safe and consistent manner, which follows a set legal process.
- 2.3. To date, Salisbury City Council has not had a policy and procedure in place to deal with unauthorised encampments, which has left the Council vulnerable and unable to tackle issues effectively, safely, and lawfully.

3. Test Case

- 3.1. On the weekend of 1st June 2024 an unauthorised encampment was noted at Hudson's Field. It was reported that this was impacting on visitors to the Caravanning & Camping Club, who reported a significant number of guests left early, which ultimately meant lost revenue.
- 3.2. On the morning of Monday 3rd June, on authorisation from the Council's Leadership Group, Officers put into motion the proposed policy and procedure and instructed Quality Bailiffs to act on the Council's behalf.
- 3.3. Early afternoon on Monday 3rd June, Quality Bailiffs hand delivered eviction notices to all of the caravans/vehicles on site, detailing that failure to do so by the next morning would see the vehicles towed away.
- 3.4. By late afternoon on Monday 3rd June, the unauthorised encampment was gone.
- 3.5. Wiltshire Police and Wiltshire Council were kept up to date throughout proceedings.
- 3.6. The cost to the Council (not including staff time and cleaning costs) was £350.00 to Quality Bailiffs. However, it should be noted that the cost to the Council could have run to £2000-£3000 if the encampment had needed to be forcibly removed.
- 3.7. On this occasion, the £350.00 fee was able to be absorbed into existing budgets.
- 3.8. Consideration should be given by Council, that budgets for 2025/26 should reflect the costs that could be incurred by tackling unauthorised encampments moving forward.

4. Recommendations

- 4.1. It is recommended that the Committee:
