

## TREASURE TRAIL

The River Avon has long been the life blood of Salisbury, providing its people with transport, drinking water, fertile land, food, mill-power and leisure over the centuries. The Cathedral was even saved by its closeness to the Avon when a fire broke out in its spire in 1780! Bucket loads of river water were hurried up in the nick of time. But the Avon is also a rare and renowned chalk stream - a wonderfully rich haven for all sorts of critters. You'll discover some of those in this treasure trail...





The two **Trail Maps** have numbered icons. These are where you will find **artwork** and **information** to solve the clues. When you have the answer to each clue, fill them into the crossword on the other side of this trail. Now, let's begin the trail near The Maltings - a place with a close link to the Avon and yet another of its uses: making beer!
